


### WHAT IS 2030 AGENDA?

- The 2030 Agenda is the result of years of negotiations at the UN between governments, called the 'post-2015 process'
- It intends to replace and build on the Millennium Government Goals which lasted from 2000 to 2015
- The 2030 Agenda is a political commitment of the governments of all 193 Member States of the United Nations (UN)

### WHAT ARE THE SDGs?

- The SDGs are the goals set to achieve the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development
- The 2030 Agenda for sustainable Development is a plan of action aimed at ending poverty, reduce inequality and save the planet
- It is universal, meaning all countries should implement it

## WHAT IS THE IMPACT OF THE SDGs ON OUR WORK?

- The SDGs is a powerful tool and a clear roadmap to eradicate poverty, reduce inequality and save the planet
- It is a great framework to further implement and monitor the CRPD and give it a strong push!
- Governments, private sectors, civil society organizations, donors have started to align to the SDGs
- It is where funding have started to be allocated; it is how CSO will hold governments to account, in addition to human rights frameworks



## WHAT IS THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN THE CRPD AND THE SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS (SDGs)?

- The CRPD is a <u>legal text</u>, it is legally binding and had to be implemented and monitored in each member state who ratified it
- The 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and its SDGs are an <u>universal</u> <u>commitment</u> made by 193 world leaders of this planet to:

### LEAVE NO ONE BEHIND



Persons with disabilities are mentioned 9 times in the 2030 Agenda and 19 times in the SDGs

#### The principle of 2030 Agenda is: Leave No One Behind

Which also means: Nothing About Us Without Us



#### Persons with disabilities are referenced directly 11 times in the 2030 Agenda:

#### Declaration

- Human rights (paragraph 19)
- Vulnerable groups (paragraph 23)
- -Education (paragraph 25)

#### The 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development


2015 to 2030

To end poverty, reduce inequality and save the planet through sustainable development

17 goals, 169 targets with approximately 230 indicators

Persons with disabilities mentioned 9 times in the 2030 Agenda
Persons with disabilities mentioned 19 times in the SDGs: Once in the introduction, seven times in targets and 11 times in the indicators

Universal



- framework for achieving the 17 Goals
- The SDGs are **not legally binding** (contrary to the UN CRPD for instance)! • However, countries, are expected to take ownership and establish a national
- Countries have the primary responsibility for follow-up and review of the SDGs with quality, accessible and timely data collection.

### SHOULD ONE GOAL OVER ANOTHER BE PRIORITISED?

Some governments tend to focus on some goals in particular (often the goals on the environment).

It is difficult to support all goals, so deaf associations should focus on goals that are relevant for them.



## WHAT IS THE LINK WITH THE CRPD?

- Similarly, to the CRPD, the SDGs have to be integrated in laws, policies and budgets for their implementation
- The CRPD focuses on disability, the SDGs mainstream the human rights of persons with disabilities
- Actors of the SDGs: Not "just the disability movement" but all stakeholders • From a national perspective, there is considerable overlap between the provisions of the CRPD and the SDGs
- Only three goals that do not have some specific links to articles within the CRPD (12: Consumption, 14: Life below water and 15: Life on land)




